- Reception children follow the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum for their first year at School. This is the same curriculum that your child will have been following at Nursery or Pre School.

Reception at Abberley.

- The EYFS curriculum was updated in September 2021.
- As we were early adopters of the new curriculum in 2020 we now have 3 years of experience of teaching the new curriculum.
- From September 2021 the Reception Baseline Assessment was also introduced. This a statutory assessment which covers all 7 areas of the EYFS. It is completed online during the first half term of school. The results of this assessment allow us to identify strengths and weaknesses in the children's learning and tailor our curriculum accordingly.
